An impressive lineup of vehicles in the air and on the ground awaits visitors to this year's two-day Wings and Wheels event at Dunsfold Aerodrome over the bank holiday weekend.

The lineup is headed by the iconic Harrier jump jet, which was developed at Dunsfold.

Other attractions include a display by the Red Arrows on both days, the Blades Aerobatic Display Team, Breitling Wingwalkers, a World War II Hawker Hurricane and the Red Bull Matadors, as well as a feast of motoring entertainment on the track.

The wheels, supplied by Brooklands Museum, include an assortment of motoring icons such as Aston Martins, Jaguars, Ferraris, AC Cobras, Porsches, TVRs and the McLaren Mercedes SR.
